

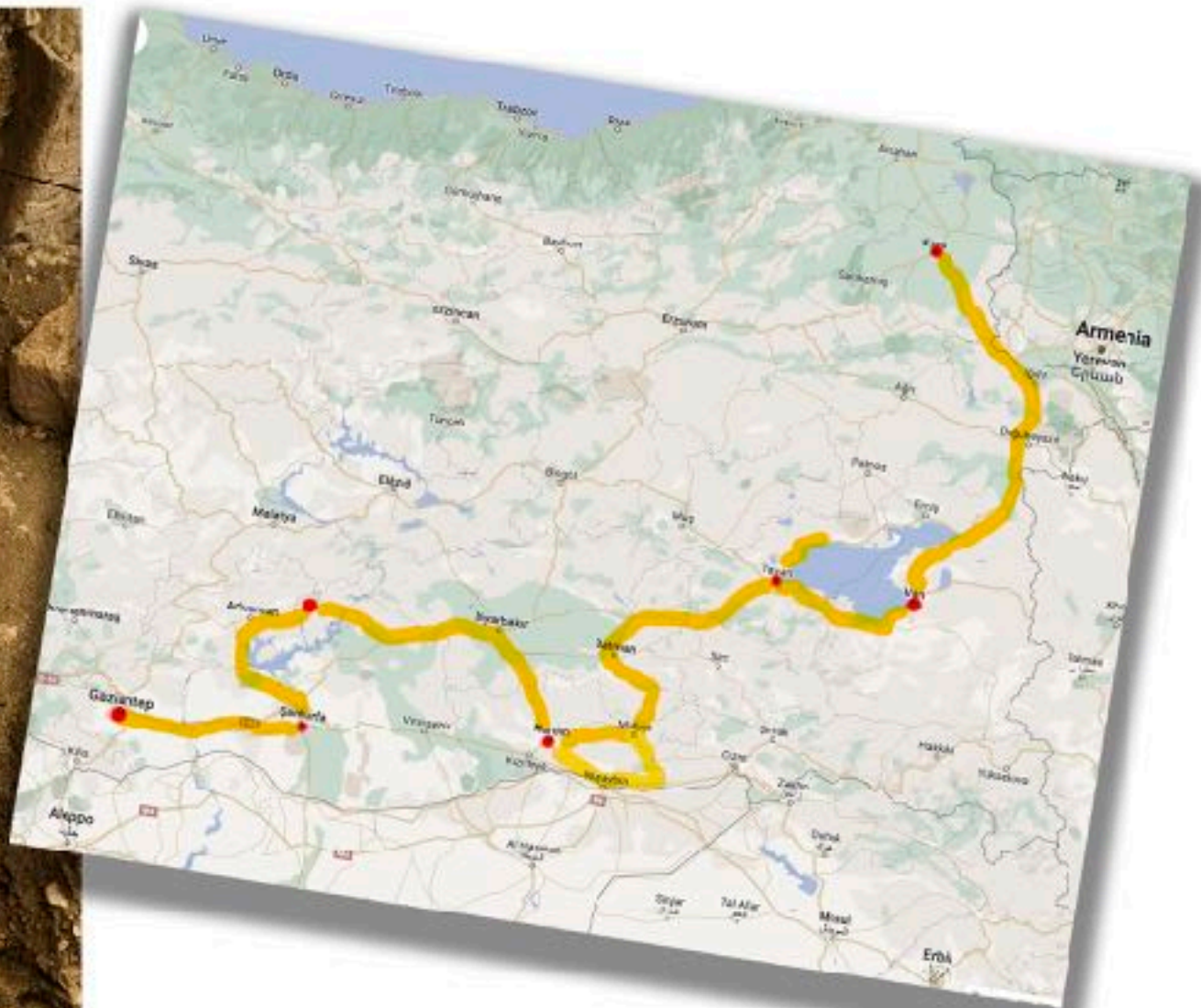

Delight your senses in the food capital of Gaziantep, savoring the finest kebabs and indulging in the sweet symphony of Baklava, all while surrounded by the cultural mosaic that defines this area. Join us as we explore ancient sites, meander through colorful markets, and witness the convergence of ancient and modern life in the bustling cities and quaint villages.

This journey promises not just a tour but a profound odyssey, leaving you with memories that transcend time. Welcome to the treasures of Eastern and Southeastern Turkey, where the predominantly Kurdish influence and the echoes of Armenian culture in select cultural areas add unique layers to the rich history and cultural diversity of this region.

Trip Notes

Day 1: Kars - Exploring Unique Vibes

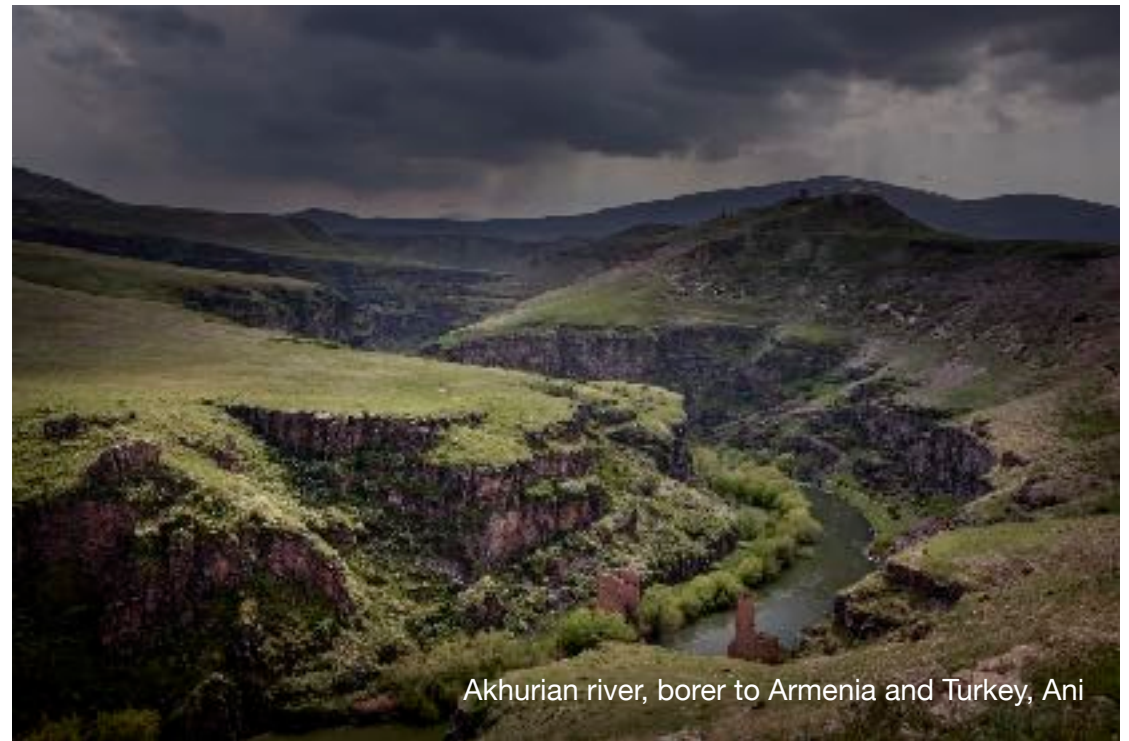
Our 17-day journey begins in Kars, one of the most easterly areas in Turkey. The city has a distinct atmosphere, especially as you wander through the old city, providing sensations unique to this region. The Russian and Armenian influences are prominently felt, particularly when visiting the castle and the 12 Apostle Church, dating back to the 10th century, now repurposed as a mosque.

Day 2: Ani - Capital of Greater Armenia Kingdom

After exploring some vibrant neighborhoods in Kars, we'll head to Ani. Despite having visited this site six times, each visit reveals something new. Ani served as the capital of the 10th-11th-century Greater Armenia Kingdom. Once a bustling city with 100,000 residents engaged in trade with the Persians and Byzantium empires, it was hailed as the "city of 1001 churches." Although many building ruins remain, the city's splendor and grandeur provide a profound understanding of its historical significance.

Day 3: Van - Journey with Scenic Views

In the morning, our journey takes us to Van, offering breathtaking views of Mount Ararat (weather permitting) and the well-preserved 18th-century administrative center, Isak Pasha Palace. As we drive south, passing through the Tendurek mountains, we'll reach the northern shores of Lake Van. A picturesque soda lake with varying shades of blue awaits us. Our hotel on the Edremit shores will provide a tranquil retreat.

Day 4: Urartian Castles and Vanadokya

Today's journey explores 6th-century BCE Urartian castles and old Islamic buildings, showcasing their distinctiveness compared to contemporary architecture. Our final destination is Vanadokya, known for rock formations reminiscent of Cappadocia. En route, we'll visit the ruins of St. Bartholomew Church, making it a long but enriching day that leaves you with a profound sense of geographical and historical knowledge upon returning to Van.

Day 5: Southern Shores of Lake Van - Armenian Heritage

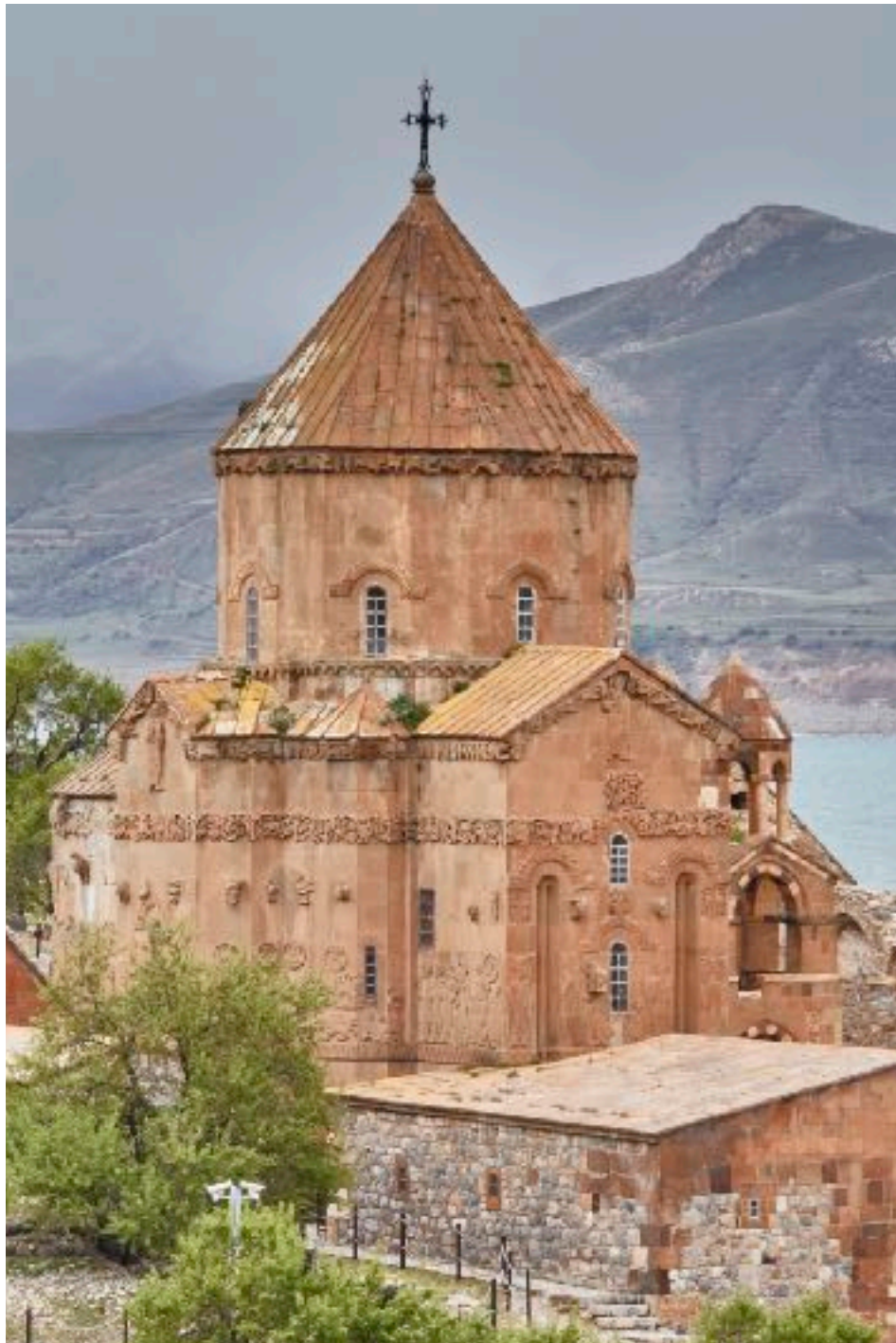
Exploration of the southern shores of Lake Van awaits us. Once an Armenian homeland, remnants of the Armenian cultural heritage from the 10th century still exist. A highlight is the Holy Cross Church on Aghtamar Island, adorned with bass reliefs depicting Old Testament scenes. Further along, the ruins of St. Thomas Monastery offer an incredible view of Lake Van, leaving visitors breathless.

Day 6: Van Castle and Surroundings - Urartian Capital

Van Castle and its surroundings are among the most intriguing sites in Van. Originally the Urartu capital of Tushba, the castle houses a new Urartu museum displaying artefacts from the 8th to 5th centuries BCE. The old Van city, mostly destroyed, retains a handful of historical remnants. The experience provides a fascinating blend of history and archaeology.

Day 7: Exploring Northern Shores of Lake Van - Ahlat and Tatvan Adventure

Leaving Van behind, we embark on a scenic journey along the northern shores of Lake Van towards Tatvan. This road trip is a perfect blend of historical marvels and natural wonders. The azure hues of Lake Van accompany us on one side, while the majestic Mt. Suphan, Turkey's third-tallest mountain, graces the other. Our first stop is the captivating Ahlat cemetery and the old city, both of which evoke a sense of time travel. Ahlat's cemetery is a fascinating repository of historical tombstones, each telling its own story. The old city, with its timeless charm, offers glimpses into bygone eras. As we venture through the countryside, absorbing the picturesque surroundings, we will reach Tatvan for an overnight stay.

Amidst these historical gems, we embark on a visit to Dara, once a pivotal city in the ancient world where Persians and Romans contested for centuries. The echoes of this historical struggle still resonate in the archaeological remnants that dot the landscape.

As the day unfolds, we immerse ourselves in the rich tapestry of Tur Abdin, appreciating the spiritual and historical significance of the churches and monasteries. Our return to Mardin is marked by reflections on the unique heritage that has shaped this captivating region over the centuries.

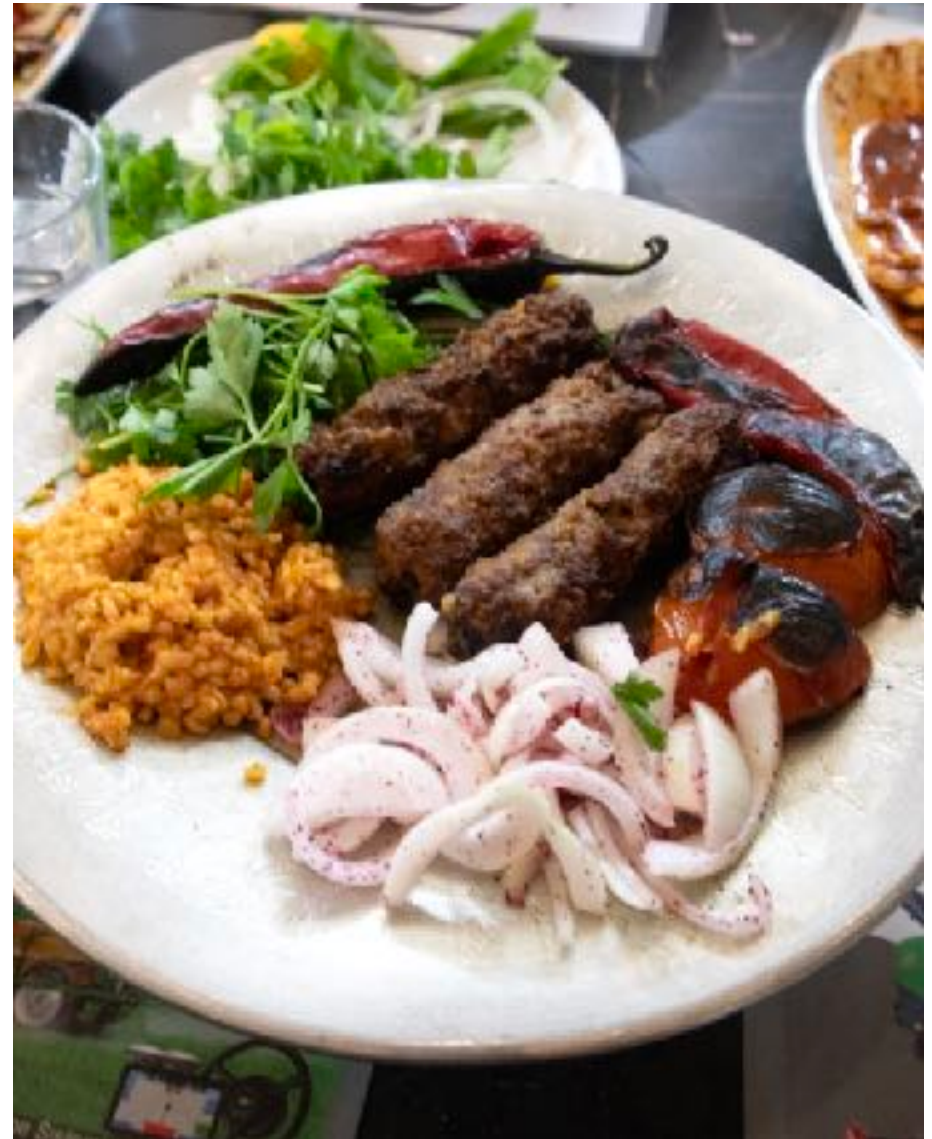
