Trip Notes

Day 1: Tblisi

Our 25-day journey begins at Tbilisi International Airport. A brief 30-minute ride transports us to our hotel nestled in the historical center of Tbilisi. The first day is dedicated to acclimatization and rest, with an optional opportunity for those with energy to explore the enchanting streets of Tbilisi, showcasing the city's unique blend of history and modernity

Day 2-3: Dilijan - Autumn Forest experience

Today, our journey leads us into Armenia. After a hearty breakfast, a 90-minute drive takes us to the Sadakhlo border crossing. Upon crossing into Armenia, our ground crew guides us to Dilijan, often dubbed the 'Armenian Switzerland' for its lush landscapes.

Dilijan welcomes us with its historic churches, intricate carvings, and stories of Armenia's rich heritage. While here, we'll explore the renowned Haghartsin Monastery, nestled amidst dense forests, showcasing Armenian architectural marvels and spiritual significance.

Additionally, our visit includes the picturesque Goshavank Monastery, known for its medieval architecture and cultural importance. These monasteries offer glimpses into Armenia's past and spiritual essence.

As we wander Dilijan's cobblestone streets, the town's laid-back vibe becomes evident, complemented by charming cafes and artisan workshops showcasing Armenian crafts. With Dilijan's vibrant autumn colors setting the scene, we immerse ourselves in Armenia's beauty, culture, and rich history.





Day 4: Yeghnis- Road trip through Lake Sevan

On the fourth day, our adventure begins early as we head southward to the tranquil shores of Lake Sevan, following the historic Silk Road route of Armenia. En route, we encounter remnants of the past such as ancient bridges and the iconic Selim caravansary. As we traverse the mesmerising landscapes of the lower Caucasus Mountains, once referred to as the Armenia Mountains, the scenery captivates us at every turn.

A standout moment awaits us with a visit to the distinctive Armenian cemetery in Noraduz, where age-old khachkars (cross-stones) stand as silent witnesses to Armenia's rich cultural heritage.


Our overnight stay in Yeghnits unveils the village's hidden treasures. Here, we explore the open-air Kzhorer church, a testament to medieval Armenian architecture. Additionally, we have the unique opportunity to discover the recently unearthed medieval Jewish Cemetery, further enriching our understanding of Yeghnits' diverse historical tapestry

Day 5-6: Tatev- Armenian village life

Over the next two days, our journey immerses us deeply into the charm and history of Tatev. As we make our way to this captivating destination, our route takes us through the picturesque town of Jermuk, renowned for its mineral springs and spa resorts. We also explore Karahunj, often referred to as Armenia's version of Stonehenge, where ancient standing stones whisper tales of bygone eras. Additionally, the majestic Shaki waterfall adds a touch of natural splendor to our itinerary.

Upon arriving near Tatev, we embark on an exhilarating cable car ride known as the "Wings of Tatev." This aerial tramway offers breathtaking views of the Vorotan River Gorge and the surrounding landscapes, culminating in a spectacular approach to the Tatev Monastery. Perched majestically atop a rugged plateau, the Tatev Monastery welcomes us with its awe-inspiring presence. This UNESCO World Heritage Site, founded in the 9th century, stands as a testament to Armenia's spiritual and cultural heritage. The monastery complex, adorned with intricate stone carvings, ancient manuscripts, and historic chapels, provides a fascinating glimpse into Armenia's rich history and religious significance.

Beyond its architectural marvels, Tatev captivates us with its simple village life and warm hospitality. Our two-night stay in an authentic village guest house offers a genuine experience, allowing us to connect deeply with the amiable locals, savor traditional Armenian cuisine, and immerse ourselves in the timeless rhythms of village life.



Day7 Yerevan: The Oldest Capital

Yerevan is our ultimate destination today, but en route, we visit Noravank monastery and Khor Virap monastery with its background of Mt Ararat — arguably one of the most iconic photographic scenes in Armenia. Despite being physically located in Turkey, Mt Ararat is the holy mountain to Armenians. We arrive in Yerevan in the late afternoon so we can be in the Opera district in time to take some night photographs. Today will conclude with us eating delicious local delicacies at one of the cities restaurants.

DAY8, Yerevan

Azad Valley — arguably the most beautiful and, probably, the most visited site in Armenia — is today's destination. It offers us many unprecedented photo opportunities ranging from nature to architecture. The valley is home to two amazing UNESCO World Heritage historical sites, the Geghard Monastery and the Garni Temple. The monastery is one of my top three destinations in Armenia with its 13th-century monastery being a uniquely complex structure as some of its chambers are carved into the adjacent mountain. The Garni Temple is the only surviving Pagan temple not only in Armenia but in the Caucuses as well. After lunch, it's time to head back to Yerevan where we have a free afternoon and evening to explore the town of our leisure

DAY9, Yerevan

Yerevan, the capital and largest city, brimming with charm and historical significance. As we navigate this bustling metropolis, we're immediately captivated by its unique blend of ancient traditions and modern influences.

Yerevan boasts many attractions that showcase its rich heritage and cultural dynamism. One cannot miss the iconic Republic Square, with its magnificent buildings and dancing fountains that come alive in the evening. Nearby, the Matenadaran Institute of Ancient Manuscripts stands as a testament to Armenia's literary legacy, housing a vast collection of medieval manuscripts.

As we meander through the city's streets, the Cascade Complex beckons with its grand staircase offering panoramic views of Mount Ararat and the city skyline. The Cascade is not only a marvel of modern architecture but also houses the Cafesjian Center for the Arts, featuring contemporary art installations and exhibits. For history enthusiasts, the History Museum of Armenia provides a deep dive into Armenia's past, showcasing artifacts and exhibits that span millennia. Meanwhile, the bustling Vernissage Market offers a vibrant shopping experience, where one can find an array of handmade crafts, artworks, and souvenirs crafted by local artisans.

Beyond its attractions, Yerevan's charm lies in its people, known for their warm hospitality and friendly demeanor. Whether savoring traditional Armenian cuisine at a local cafe, engaging with artisans in the market, or simply strolling through the city's old and new quarters, Yerevan offers a glimpse into the soul of Armenia.

As the day unfolds, our exploration of Yerevan continues, each moment revealing a new facet of this captivating city, leaving an indelible mark on our journey through Armenia

DAY11, Haghpat "From Sacred Sites to Architectural Marvels"

Embarking on this less-traveled route, our journey unfolds through sleepy villages and past ancient churches, each echoing tales of Armenia's storied past. As we navigate this picturesque landscape, we are drawn closer to one of the crowning jewels of Armenian heritage: the spiritual epicenter of the Armenian Apostolic Church, Etchmiadzin.

Etchmiadzin stands as a beacon of religious significance, housing the Cathedral which is widely recognized as the first Christian Cathedral in the world. Notably, Armenians are the First Nation to embrace Christianity as their state religion, making Etchmiadzin's historical importance even more profound. This sacred site is not only revered for its role in Armenia's spiritual journey but is also inscribed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Adjacent to the grandeur of the Cathedral, the quaint settings of two smaller 6th-century churches, Gayaneh and Hripsime, add to the spiritual ambiance, each contributing to the rich tapestry of Armenian religious architecture.

Before our exploration of Etchmiadzin, our itinerary takes us to the evocative ruins of Zvartnots, another UNESCO-listed archaeological site. Set against the majestic backdrop of Mount Ararat, these ruins whisper tales of ancient civilizations, architectural marvels, and bygone eras, offering a glimpse into Armenia's illustrious past.

Continuing our journey, we traverse picturesque mountain ranges, each bend revealing breathtaking vistas, as we make our way to Haghpat. Situated amidst lush landscapes, Haghpat Monastery is renowned for its architectural significance and cultural importance. Alongside its sister site, Sanahin (both Unesco heritage sites) Haghpat and Sanahin stands as a testament to Armenia's rich heritage and artistic achievements, with intricate stone carvings, historic chapels, and a serene ambiance that captivates visitors.

DAY12 13, Telavi Two days of History, Wine, and Culture: Exploring Telavi and Beyond"

We immerse ourselves in the captivating allure of Telavi, a quaint town steeped in history and culture. Our journey begins as we delve into the rich legacy of Telavi, once the residence of the last king of Georgia, Erekle II. Experience the vibrant atmosphere of the colorful agricultural market, where local produce and traditions come to life. Next, we venture to the historic Gremi citadel, where the ancient walls echo tales of the past. Explore the intricately adorned frescoes in the church, offering a glimpse into Georgia's artistic heritage and religious significance. As the day unfolds, indulge in a delightful lunch paired with a wine tasting experience at a local winery. Savor the distinct flavors of Georgian wines, celebrated for their unique characteristics and unparalleled quality.

Continuing our exploration, we visit the Tsinandali Estate, the summer residence of the illustrious Chavchavadze family. Wander through the estate's picturesque grounds, reflecting on its historical significance and architectural beauty. Our journey concludes with a fascinating encounter with a Qvevri master, who unveils the secrets behind crafting these iconic Georgian vessels used to store homemade wine underground. Gain insights into the age-old techniques, traditions, and cultural importance of Qvevri, a symbol of Georgia's viticultural heritage.

DAY 14-15 From Ancient Capitals to Majestic Peaks: A Two-Day Exploration of Mtskheta and Kazbegi"

Embark on a captivating two-day journey, beginning with your guide and driver in the morning as you delve into the rich history and natural beauty of Georgia. Your adventure commences in Mtskheta, the ancient capital and spiritual heart of the country. Explore UNESCO World Heritage Sites, including the 6th-century Church of Jvari and the revered 11th-century Svetitskhoveli Cathedral, where legends tell of housing the Robe of Christ. Learn about St. Nino's pivotal role in officially converting Georgia to Christianity in 337 AD, setting the foundation for the nation's enduring spiritual legacy.

As your exploration continues, ascend by 4WD vehicles to the awe-inspiring Trinity Church of Gergeti, perched 2170 meters above sea level. Drink in panoramic views of the surrounding landscapes before journeying to the picturesque Dariali Gorge. Admire the distant Russian Border and embark on a scenic walk to the mesmerizing Gveleti Waterfalls, experiencing the region's natural wonders firsthand.

Transitioning to Kazbegi, traverse the historic Georgian Military Highway, an essential artery connecting Russia with Transcaucasia for centuries. Ascend the scenic Jvari Pass, reaching 2396 meters, and pause at the iconic "Friendship Monument" viewpoint. Here, soak in sweeping vistas of the Great Caucasus, with the possibility of witnessing the majestic Kazbek Mountain, standing sentinel at 5054 meters.

Conclude your memorable journey with a leisurely evening in Kazbegi, where you'll enjoy an authentic dinner with a local family, experiencing the art of crafting traditional Khinkali. Throughout your two-day exploration, immerse yourself in the captivating blend of history, culture, and natural beauty that defines the enchanting regions of Mtskheta and Kazbegi.





DAY16, Akhalsikhe, North to South road trip

As we descend from the towering mountains, our journey takes us through a scenic pass that bridges two distinctive regions of Georgia. The first highlight awaits at the Ananuri architectural complex, a medieval marvel set against the backdrop of the Aragvi River. Here, ancient fortifications and churches whisper tales of bygone eras. Continuing our exploration, we arrive in Gori, the birthplace of Joseph Stalin. A visit to the Stalin Museum offers insights into his life and legacy, followed by a delightful pause for a traditional Georgian lunch. Our day

DAY17, Akhalsikhe, Vardzia and Khertvisi Fortress

Our journey leads us to one of Georgia's most iconic landmarks, the Vardzia cave town, dating back to the 12th century. Along the way, we pause to explore the impressive Khertvisi Fortress, constructed in the 10th century. The awe-inspiring Vardzia cave city continues to captivate visitors with its grandeur, beauty, and mystical ambiance. Exploring this cave town transports you back to the 12th century, a period when Georgia was flourishing during its renaissance. Within its depths, you'll discover charming churches adorned with exquisite frescoes, dwelling guarters, wine cellars, granaries, and even a pharmacy and library. In the afternoon, we return to Akhaltsikhe, known as the "New Castle" in Georgian. Here, we ascend to Rabati Castle, perched atop a hill, and explore its museum. The museum offers a journey through time, spanning from the 4th-millennium-BC Kura-Araxes Culture to 19th-century regional costumes.



DAY18, Kutaisi, the other capital

Today, we journey to Kutaisi, Georgia's third-largest city and historically recognized as the capital of the legendary Colchis, known as Aia in ancient times. According to myth, Jason and the Argonauts sailed up the river Phazisi (now known as Rioni) in search of the Golden Fleece.

Upon arrival in Kutaisi, we embark on a leisurely stroll through its historic old town. As an added experience, we visit the vibrant agricultural market, offering a glimpse into contemporary local life.

Our day continues with a visit to the UNESCO World Heritage Site, Gelati Monastery and Academy, founded in the 12th century and housing the tomb of Georgia's revered King David the Builder. Notably, the main church's altar features a mosaic of the Virgin Mary, crafted from 2 million golden stones. Concluding our exploration, we venture into the subterranean wonders of Prometheus Grotto, marveling at its captivating stalactites and stalagmites, a true testament to nature's splendor.



Day 19, Mestia: From Martvili Canyon to Svaneti

This day in Georgia begins with a journey to one of its most captivating natural landmarks: Martvili Canyon. As the morning sun casts its glow, visitors are treated to the enchanting sights of this geological marvel. The highlight of this segment is a tranquil 20-minute boat ride through the serene Dadiani Bath canyon. The gentle ripples of the water and the surrounding verdant landscapes create a sense of peace, making it a perfect start to our day. Following this serene boat journey, a leisurely stroll beckons along the canyon's pathways, where the iconic old bridge and the shimmering river provide picturesque moments for avid photographers.

As the day unfolds, our path takes us on a scenic drive towards the rugged beauty of Svaneti. En route, a stop at the renowned Enguri Hydroelectric Plant offers a glimpse into Georgia's technological advancements amidst its natural wonders. However, the real spectacle lies ahead, where the Enguri and Chubrula rivers converge in a breathtaking display of nature's artistry. Here, amidst dense coniferous forests and glistening mountain rivers, we pause for a cherished photo opportunity, encapsulating the essence of Georgia's diverse and awe-inspiring landscapes.

Day 20 Mestia: Hike to Chalaadi Glacier or relax in Mestia

Today, our adventure unfolds as we embark on a journey towards the stunning Chalaadi Glacier, a captivating natural wonder nestled amidst the rugged landscapes of Georgia. After a scenic drive that sets the stage for the day's explorations, we arrive at our starting point.

For those eager to delve deeper into nature's embrace, an optional 3-hour trek awaits. This trail promises mesmerising views of the glacier, with every step offering a new perspective of its icy expanse juxtaposed against the backdrop of towering peaks. The trek provides an immersive experience, allowing participants to connect with the pristine wilderness and marvel at the raw beauty of the surroundings.

For those preferring a more leisurely pace or seeking alternative activities, there are opportunities to explore the nearby areas, soak in the serene ambiance, or engage in shorter walks to viewpoints that offer panoramic vistas of the glacier and surrounding landscapes.

After enjoying the splendours of Chalaadi Glacier, we make our way back to Mestia, a journey filled with reflections on the day's experiences. Upon our return, our exploration continues with a visit to the History and Ethnography Museum. This cultural gem offers a deep dive into Svaneti's rich heritage, showcasing exhibits, artefacts, and displays that illuminate the region's storied past, traditions, and the lives of its inhabitants throughout history.

Day 21 Mestia: Journey to Ushguli

Today, our expedition leads us on a thrilling 4WD journey to Ushguli, a gem nestled amidst the majestic landscapes of Svaneti. Renowned as the highest continuously inhabited village in Europe, Ushguli promises not only unparalleled natural beauty but also a glimpse into centuries-old traditions and lifestyles.

As we traverse the scenic route, the journey itself becomes a highlight. En route, we traverse charming Svanetian villages, each exuding its unique charm and character. These picturesque hamlets invite us to pause, allowing for short stops to capture captivating photographs or to meander through narrow cobblestone lanes. Immersing ourselves in the local ambiance, we gain insights into the daily rhythms of life and witness firsthand the warm hospitality of the Svan people.


